This is an opportunity to recognize talented people in the organization or an entire Friends group and nominate them for one of the Friends of Connecticut Libraries Awards.

The FOCL awards will be presented at the annual meeting Saturday, June 15, at the Avon Free Public Library. Those chosen by the awards committee will receive the recognition in the company of people who understand and personify dedicated library service.

There are three categories of

awards available to small, medium and large libraries. The Friends Group Award is focused on the total effort of the Friends Group. To qualify, the group has either accomplished major goals in support of the library and the community, provided new and/or innovative programs or raised significant money or awareness by attracting the community to the library.

The FOCL Individual Achievement Award is given to one or two individuals in a FOCL group who have made significant contributions to the Friends group, such as a lifetime achievement, exceptional library service, substantial increase in book sale or fundraising profits, or a great idea that has been implemented.

Finally, the FOCL Focused Project Award is usually orchestrated by a small group or committees.

Some examples of types of projects that would be considered include a successful membership drive, a great idea implemented, an outstanding use of media or efforts that raised significant money or awareness by attracting the community to the library.

The application will be mailed to all library directors and Friends groups.

We are requesting that the summary (no more than 1,000 words) be submitted electronically in a word processing format.



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Clark Library Renames Children's Room After Friends Member

he Clark Memorial Library in Bethany renamed their newly renovated children's room in honor of longtime **Friends of the Bethany Library** member Nancy J. Disbrow.

The library called Disbrow "one of our most dedicated longtime supporters." Disbrow is a lifelong Bethany resident and a second-generation librarian.

Her mother served as head librarian for Clark Memorial Library in the 1950s and 60s, and Nancy often rode the bus to the library after school, rather than to her home. She has fond memories of reading near the upstairs fireplace in the original library structure.

Disbrow worked professionally as a public and school librarian in New Haven, and then joined the faculty of Southern Connecticut State University and spent many years training new librarians.

She retired in 2013 as an Associate professor emeritus.

Disbrow's connections to Clark Memorial Library continued throughout her adult life; she served for many years as a BLA board member, and continues to be an active member and officer of the Friends of the Library.

She is a founding member of the 1937 Legacy Society, with a substantial contribution to its endowment.

Most recently, Disbrow donated her collection of professional children's literature books to the Library, and been instrumental in fundraising for the Children's Room renovation.
